PASTOR'S CORNER: As a priest, I generally do all I can to avoid politics in what I say or write. I am a minister of the Gospel first and foremost, and I would hate to have my political opinions (and I do have them) somehow stand in the way of someone's hearing the message of Jesus Christ. But politics is part of our life, and the Gospel is meant to touch every aspect of our life - including politics. In this light, I could not fail to say something about the astonishing spectacle of an armed mob attacking the Capitol in Washington, DC, the very symbol of our American democracy, disrupting our elected representatives in the exercise of their civic duties. I was deeply shaken by it all, as I know many of you were. This is not the sort of thing that is supposed to happen in our country. But there it was for the whole world to see - the kind of thing that gives great comfort to our enemies. No matter what your politics are, this is unacceptable. My point here is not to assign blame - there is plenty to go around. But just to say that this is more than a problem of politics, it is a problem of the soul. Grievance leads to anger; anger leads to hatred. And left unchecked, we have a country divided into uncompromising camps, each one seeing the other camps as irredeemable enemies. Each side demonizing the other. This Monday is Martin Luther King, Jr. Day. Here was the kind of man whose wisdom we need today. A man with a passion for justice and truth, but pursued in a non-violent way. And his non-violence was not just a tactic ... it was rooted in his Christian vision of the dignity of all persons, oppressors and oppressed alike. Dr. King understood that to break a cycle of injustice, one had to break the cycle of hate. "Darkness cannot drive out darkness," he wrote, "only light can do that. Hate cannot drive out hate; only love can do that." Dr. King also clearly understood that the greatest victim of our hate is ourself: "Like an unchecked cancer, hate corrodes the personality and eats away its vital unity. Hate destroys a man's sense of values and his objectivity. It causes him to describe the beautiful as ugly and the ugly as beautiful, and to confuse the true with the false and the false with the true." Debate, disagree, argue, vote, protest ... but never forget that the one you debate with is your brother and sister.
